Dealing with the Media

Depending on your job and location, you may never meet journalists or you may have regular contact. This provides a guide to dealing with journalists so that your organisation benefits and you provide a professional service to the media.

Why choose this vocation?

Professional and Personal Development Planning for Relief Work and studies the motivations for becoming relief workers and ways for individuals to identify their strengths and /or weaknesses and means to develop their skills as relief workers.

Where to next?

Identify what to do next and how to go about it and know how to make contact with key agencies.

Delivery:

The course is presented in line with adult learning principles incorporating structured tutorials, interactive workshops, case studies, video, and scenario based training. Individual and group work is conducted throughout the course.
